The history of the Catholic Church in Mexico dates from the period of the Spanish conquest (1519–21) and has continued as an institution in Mexico into the twenty-first century. Catholicism is one of the two major legacies from the Spanish colonial era, the other being Spanish as the nation's language. The Catholic Church was a privileged institution until the mid nineteenth century. Although Brading does not pursue a single thesis in Church and State (he rather modestly claims that this study has a more "introductory character" than the preceding volumes and calls for more research into some of the topics covered), there is much useful information in this, his latest contribution.
