The 19th century saw the appearance of a proper system of public libraries. Now most countries have their own national libraries. Many old university libraries have rich collections of books: Oxford and Cambridge in England, Harvard and Yale in the United States. It holds about 90 million items — books and manuscripts. The library was founded in 1800 in Washington, DC for the use of Congress and later became a public library. Bibliothèque Nationale dates back to the 17th century and the British Museum Library was set in the 18th century. The State Public Library in Moscow was founded in 1862 and has unique collections of books. Modern libraries do their best to help people get information as quickly as possible. They use computers and electronic catalogues. Egbert (died November 766) was an 8th-century cleric who established the archdiocese of York in 735. In 737, Egbert's brother became king of Northumbria and the two siblings worked together on ecclesiastical issues. Egbert was a correspondent of Bede and Boniface and the author of a legal code for his clergy. Other works have been ascribed to him, although the attribution is doubted by modern scholars. Our earliest manuscripts of this pontifical are from the late eleventh century, Troyes Bibl. de la Ville 2272, and Vat. Barb. Lat. 27. Many of the manuscripts noted in the Institut de Recherche et d'Histoire des Textes appear to have been the result of the Abbé Guizard's researches on the works of Ivo in general. The ms. is now in the Bibliothèque nationale in Paris (Lat. 10575); the pontifical, leaves 7-172, had been doubtfully associated with St. Egbert because of excerpt from Egbert's *Poenitentiale* on leaves 3-6 of the ms.
