October 25, 2019 - Thistle and millet attract finches and blackbirds. Also include suet cakes, fresh fruit such as blueberries, cherries, and oranges, and nuts. #2 Fresh water. Birds need a source of water all year. Be sure to keep the water clean and use a warmer in the winter to keep the water from freezing over. #3 Native plants. Learn about plants that are native to your area. Urge your birds to see your garden as a one-stop shop for their daily routine. Water is particularly vital for seed-eating birds that have dry meals and need to be able to wash them down. Keep an eye on your birdbath to ensure it doesn't freeze over in winter, and when defrosting it do not use salt - this can kill the birds. Avoid using garden netting, especially during the breeding season, and place feeders away from your house to minimize the risk of birds colliding with windows. Let them build their own. It's great if your birds use the nestboxes you've put up, but it is even more satisfying if they create natural nest sites.
