The Empire of Brazil was a constitutional monarchy which ruled over Brazil from 7 September 1822 to 15 November 1889. Brazil had been the seat of the Portuguese monarchy during the Peninsular War , with King Joao VI of Portugal establishing himself and his government in the Brazilian capital of Rio de Janeiro . After the war's end, Joao returned to Portugal and left his son and heir, Dom Pedro , to rule over Brazil as regent. Since October 1822, Dom Pedro had been emperor of Brazil, while his father was king of Portugal. The dramatic climax occurred 2o Aug. The new Empire of Brazil, heir to the Portuguese policy in South America, expected to reach the river Plata and to dominate Montevideo, the capital of the Republic of Uruguay. Buenos Aires, which had inherited at the same time the Spanish secular views, notwithstanding that it was itself menaced by anarchy, aided the Republic of Uruguay to obtain its independence from Brazil in a war which lasted three years, and whose chief purpose was to drive out the Brazilians from the Plata (1828).
